



## BPSC sends legal notices to politicians, and coaching institutes for leveling allegations against the Commission

The Bihar Public Service Commission (BPSC) on Saturday said it has issued legal notices to “many individuals, including politicians” who have levelled “baseless” allegations against the body on the row over the Combined Competitive Examination (CCE) held on December 13 across the state.

Speaking to PTI, Rajesh Kumar Singh, Examination Controller, BPSC, said, “The commission has sent notices to a number of individuals, including politicians, certain people associated with coaching centres... those who have made baseless allegations against the BPSC... some more notices will be sent shortly.”

Although the examination controller did not disclose the names of those to whom notices have been sent, Jan Suraj Party’s vice president Y V Giri confirmed that one of the recipients was party founder Prashant

Kishor.

Giri told reporters that the notice appeared to be “misconceived and deserved to be ignored”.

The BPSC notice asked Kishor to provide “full details of irrefutable and verifiable proofs and evidence” within seven days to support his allegations regarding malpractices in the Integrated 70th CCE.

The notice accused Kishor of making defamatory and baseless statements. According to the notice, Kishor recently alleged in interviews that “jobs of children were sold for Rs 1 crore to Rs 1.5 crore” and claimed the scandal amounted to “more than Rs 1,000 crore”.

Another recipient of the notice was Patna-based tutor and You-Tuber, Khan Sir, who voiced anguish over the BPSC action.

“Yes, I have received a legal notice from the BPSC for my speeches in support of the protesting BPSC aspirants. I will soon send my reply after consulting my lawyers. But, one

thing I must say that I will keep fighting for the cause of students,” he told PTI.

“We are also preparing to approach the Patna High Court over the issue pertaining to the alleged irregularities in the examination conducted on December 13,” he added.

The police have also registered a fresh FIR against a Patna-based coaching institute, linked to Khan Sir, for allegedly spreading misinformation related to the BPSC exam.

Sources in the BPSC confirmed that notices have been sent to several other individuals and owners of Patna-based coaching institutes in this regard.

Meanwhile, an Independent MP from Purna, Rajesh Ranjan alias Pappu Yadav, has called for a Bihar bandh on January 12 in support of the students seeking cancellation of BPSC’s December 13 exam.

Varun Choudhary, national president of Congress’s student wing National Students’ Union of India (NSUI), along with his supporters, on Saturday visited Gardani Bagh, where the protesting BPSC aspirants have

## Uttarakhand Schools to Mandate 10 subjects for Class X students

The State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT) has prepared a draft of the state curriculum framework, aiming to enhance educational standards and better prepare students for future challenges.

Drafting experts claim that the new curriculum is a “revolutionary step” in skill development, marking the first major implementation since the NEP of 1986, which followed the policy of 1968.

Uttarakhand’s Education Minister Dhan Singh Rawat said, “Actions are being taken in accordance with the recommendations of the NEP. The draft of the state curriculum framework, prepared through various committees, will be reviewed by the state government. It includes only those subjects that have been recommended by the NEP.”

“All children studying in government schools will be required to take these subjects. They will have the option to change subjects starting from the 11th grade,” said Pradeep Rawat, the Additional Director of the SCERT.

He added, “Once the draft of the State Curriculum Frame-



work (SCF) is prepared, it will be sent to the government for approval.”

Speaking to this daily, Dr Mukul Kumar Sati, Additional Director of Secondary Education, shared insights on the impact of the NEP. “The inclusion of new subjects under this policy will foster an entrepreneurial spirit among students. These will include courses in beauty and wellness, drone technology, and various IT-related programs, he said.

Sati further noted, “The new generation is increasingly developing a mindset not only to launch their own startups but also to create job opportunities for other young people.”

He remarked, “Vocational subjects are fine, but there should be a balance between academic pressure and practical work for the new generation. This will help cultivate a sense of professionalism in students.”

## BCI directs nationwide verification of advocates amid growing fake degree cases

The Bar Council of India unequivocally directs all State Bar Councils to prioritize and complete a comprehensive verification process of all advocates on their rolls. Any instances of fake or fraudulent enrollment must be promptly referred to the Bar Council of India under Section 26(1) of the Advocates Act, 1961. Noncompliance with this statutory mandate will be treated as a dereliction of duty and may invite appropriate legal consequences.

Many Bar Councils have taken preliminary measures by identifying and removing advocates found to have enrolled on the basis of fake degrees. However, it is imperative to emphasize that under Section 26(1) of the Advocates Act, 1961, the statutory authority to remove an advocate from the rolls of any State Bar Council vests solely with the Bar Council of India. Such re-



movals must follow a reference made by the respective State Bar Council, as prescribed under the Act. Any deviation from this statutory process undermines the authority of the Bar Council of India and violates the provisions of the Advocates Act, 1961, which must be adhered to without exception.

It is with regret that the Bar Council of India observes the widespread failure of some of the State Bar Councils, to initiate strong verification processes. Reports and evidence suggest that thousands of advocates across India may have enrolled using fake law degrees, forged academic certificates, or falsified qualifications. These fraudulent enrollments compro-

mise the integrity of the legal profession and diminish public trust in the judiciary and legal institutions.

However, the concern is the conduct of some recognized and deemed universities that have been found issuing law degrees in violation of the norms established by the Bar Council of India. In certain instances, these institutions have turned legal education into a mere commercial transaction under the guise of education. Such unethical practices must be immediately eradicated to safeguard the sanctity of legal education and prevent further erosion of professional standards.

The Supreme Court’s constitution of a High-Powered Committee on 10.04.2023 has provided crucial monitoring in enforcing the Bar Council of India’s verification framework. The Committee’s regular monitoring of the verification pro-

provides study notes to students via WhatsApp. He also answers their questions through the messaging platform. When asked, Baba writes that his goal is to educate students and help them become officers. Regarding his silence, he explains that it helps him accumulate energy, which he uses for the welfare of the world," he explained.

Recently, Rabri Baba has also become a popular figure at the Sangam. Also known as Shri Mahant Devgiri from Shri Panchayati Akhada Mahanirvani, he is drawing attention for his service.

Every day, starting at 8 am and continuing late into the night, Baba prepares creamy rabri by boiling milk in a large kadhai. He serves it to devotees with great love, bringing joy to their hearts. His selfless service has become one of the special highlights of the Kumbh.

# IIT-Bombay launches e-Post graduate Diploma in E-mobility

The programme is designed for early and mid-career professionals, scientists and R&D professionals, entrepreneurs, academicians and recent graduates. The curriculum will cover topics in electric vehicle design, battery technology, electrical drives, power electronics, and more, with a focus on both conceptual and

practical learning through live, interactive sessions, a statement from Great Learning said.

Participants will have sample projects like vehicle sub-system modelling, embedded controller for electric motors, simulation of power electronic systems, battery modelling techniques and degradation phenomenon, modelling and control of EV chargers, impact assessment of EVs on grid infrastructure supported by IIT Bombay's academic resources for seamless learning, it added.

Candidates holding a BE/BTech degree or a 4-year BSc/BS degree in a relevant domain of engineering or technology are eligible to apply for the programme. Candidates with a postgraduate (MTech/ MSc/ MS) or doctorate degree in a relevant domain of engineering and technology can also apply.

# JEE-Advanced: SC agrees to hear plea against cut in exam attempts

The Supreme Court agreed to examine a plea against bringing down from three to two, the attempts given to Joint Entrance Examination (JEE)-Advanced aspirants.

When the plea came up before a bench of Justices B R Gavai and Augustine George Masih, the petitioner's counsel said, "This matter pertains to the IIT (Indian Institute of Technology) admission entrance examination in which the number of attempts has been reduced from three to two." The lawyer said a similar plea was listed before the bench on January 10 following which the court directed both to be tagged.

The fresh plea, filed through advocate Sanjeet Kumar Trivedi, said it related to the process for admissions into the prestigious IITs but the joint admission board (JAB), entrusted to conduct the JEE-Advanced exam, changed the eligibility criteria for students in an "arbitrary" manner.

"The JAB, vide its press release dated November 5, 2024, first fixed the permissible number of attempts for JEE-Advanced at three, only to change it abruptly vide another press release dated November 18, 2024, and thereby reducing the number of attempts to two," the plea said.

"The abrupt changes in the eligibility criteria," it said,

"has affected the petitioner as well as thousands of similarly situated persons denying them a valuable opportunity to enter the IITs."

The plea said the change in eligibility criteria was against the principles of natural justice and added, "The impugned notification is also in violation of principles of legitimate expectation and promissory estoppel."

# NEET UG 2025 application starting in 'due course of time' NTA asks candidates to update their Aadhaar

The National Testing Agency (NTA) which will be starting the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test Undergraduate (NEET UG) applications soon has asked the aspirants to update the Aadhaar details.

To support the integration of APAAR ID (Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry) with NEET UG 2025, candidates are encouraged to use their APAAR ID as well as Aadhaar-based authentication during the application and examination



process.

NTA while asking the candidates to update the Aadhaar details said that updated credentials are recommended for ease of verification, registration process and to enhance the integrity of

the examination process said that NEET UG 2025 registration process shall be starting in due course of time.

Candidates are advised to update their credentials in Aadhaar, preferably as per their Class 10 marksheet or passing certificate and facial recognition data. Also, candidates should make ensure that the Aadhaar is linked with a valid mobile number for OTP-based authentication.

Nowadays, courses like BSc Biotechnology and BSc Information Technology are increasingly preferred by students as they offer broader career prospects and growth.

# NTA exams may go UPSC's way for better security

The government is mulling to conduct all entrance exams to higher education institutions (HEIs) using the UPSC model to ensure strict security and avoid any future allegations of cheating and mismanagement, highly placed sources said.

The Union education ministry is considering this approach so as to involve all state and district administrations during the entrance exams, which will be conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA). "Now,

the government is thinking of conducting all entrance exams to HEIs using the UPSC model. The UPSC model means the district administration and the state government are involved in the entrance exam process," the source told this paper.

UPSC exam centres are heavily secured by district administrations, with the collector and superintendent of police involved in the entire process. The government is looking at applying the same rigour for conducting various entrance exams, which include CUET-UG, CUET-PG,

JEE-MAINS, and NEET-UG. NEET-UG was mired in controversy following allegations of cheating and mismanagement last year.

The source said the entire state administration is involved in the UPSC exams. "This will help make the entire exam procedure much more secure as the state administration will be part of the process. The government's thinking is to conduct all exams related to admission in such a fashion. Also, the state administration will feel part of the exam system."

The plan to adopt the UPSC model was discussed following the recommendation of the committee led by former ISRO Chairman Dr K Radhakrishnan. The committee was set up to suggest exam reforms, better security protocols, and their operation by the education ministry following the NEET-UG fiasco. Last month, Union education minister Dharmendra Pradhan had announced that NTA will focus solely on conducting entrance exams for admission to higher education institutions.

## NEET PG 2024: Over 24,000 seats vacant in MCC round 3 counselling

The Medical Counselling Committee (MCC) will fill 24,314 seats in round three of the NEET PG 2024 counselling. After a reduction in the cut-off, there are 15902 seats from the virtual round, 8313 seats from the clear vacancy round and 999 newly added seats making the total 24,314 vacancies for round

3. Candidates have time till January 16 up to 8 am to fill the choice in the order of preference. The MCC had revised the NEET PG counselling schedule due to a reduction in the cut-off scores.

This change allowed more aspirants to take part in the admis-

sion process and ensure that PG seats in medical colleges do not remain vacant.

The processing of the seat allotment will be done between January 16 and January 17. The reporting and the joining at the allotted colleges will be done between January 18 and January 25.

been staging a dharna for the last three weeks seeking cancellation of the December 13 exam. He also observed 'maun-vrat' in support of students for some time at the protest site. processes has addressed systemic delays in identifying nonpracticing advocates, verifying certificates, and preparing electoral rolls. This need for stringent supervision and transparency culminated in the amended Rule 32 on 26.06.2023, ensuring that only practicing advocates participate in Bar Council elections, thereby safeguarding the credibility and professionalism of the legal fraternity.

Rule 32 authorizes the Bar Council of India to extend the tenure of State Bar Council members to allow adequate time for verification and electoral preparation. The rule mandates the completion of verification within 18 months and elections within 6 months thereafter. Failure to comply results in the dissolution of State Bar Councils and the formation of Special Committees under Section 8A of the Advocates Act, 1961. This strong framework, reinforced by Supreme Court directives, has enhanced the Council's ability to uphold transparency and accountability within the profession.

However, the Bar Council of India has noted with disapproval the conduct of certain educational institutions, including Chaudhary Charan Singh University, in delaying the issuance of verification reports and demanding verification fees before processing such requests. These actions are in blatant contravention of the directives of the Supreme Court, which categori-

cally mandate that universities and educational institutions facilitate the verification process promptly, without imposing financial impediments. The Bar Council of India strongly directs Chaudhary Charan Singh University and all other universities to comply with these binding guidelines forthwith.

Press communication issued in this regards stated that the presence of fake lawyers in the rolls of State Bar Councils compromises the credibility of the electoral process for Bar Council elections. Allowing fraudulent entries to persist within the rolls undermines the democratic fabric of the Bar and renders the entire electoral process questionable. To uphold the sanctity of Bar Council elections, it is imperative that only genuine advocates form part of the electoral rolls.

The Bar Council of India reiterates that it is fully obligated to ensure the removal of unqualified and fake lawyers from the profession. It has directed all State Bar Councils to provide detailed reports on their verification processes, supported by concrete evidence, to enable appropriate action. The Bar Council of India will compile and submit a consolidated report on this matter to the Hon'ble Supreme Court.

The verification drive has also led to preemptive surrenders by advocates aware of their fraudulent status. This ensures that no individual evades accountability for actions that have harmed public trust and compromised the legal system. The Bar Council of India is addressing fraudulent enrollments at their root, paving the way for an ethical and transparent legal profession.

# Difficulties in giving a presentation and ways to overcome them



Nowadays, it is quite relevant how to present this or that topic effectively and what methods to use to make the desired impression. Presentations are a fundamental part of business life. People are constantly having to present their short-term or long-term research results, completed projects, etc. to an audience. It is good when a person has the ability to conduct a presentation. This allows you to demonstrate your abilities, planned or completed work. Any of us will have to give a speech in front of a certain audience at least once. helps to remember the topic better. During the project, the student has to take on the role of presenter several times. How he presents his product is important. He may create the "best product," but if he lacks presentation skills, he will have a hard time showing others his "great work."

Presentation skills, participation in debates, cooperation, teamwork, and communication are not taught as separate subjects, but the modern task of education is to develop in children skills that are useful in all situations. Today, the development of psychosocial skills is topical. A modern person needs effective communication, presentation, and healthy discussion skills for development, self-establishment, and realization in society. Based

on the above, I believe that we should start developing presentation skills in elementary school, of course, taking into account their age and in an appropriate dose.

The modern world of the 21st century has entered a stage of active progress. Such active development requires the presentation of information in a form such as a presentation. Presentation is a Latin word meaning "to present." It is a public presentation of something to an audience. Its purpose is to introduce one's work to a certain group of people.

Giving a presentation correctly and beautifully is quite a difficult task. Everyone gets nervous when giving a speech, no matter who it is intended for, peers, classmates, or complete strangers. At this time, it is difficult to concentrate, sometimes we forget what to say, and strange thoughts come to mind: "I wish I hadn't come...", "I wish my speech had been postponed...", "What if...", and so on. We must not forget: such a mood is always easy for the audience to notice, so let's talk to ourselves at least a day in advance and "make believe" that this is a "test" for us that we must pass.

This will help us develop our ability to reflect and gain experience.

No one is born a good presenter; the art of public speaking is an acquired competence. Through

a presentation, a teacher conveys information, a vision, or an idea to students. An effective presentation promotes learning, student engagement, and a clear understanding of the issue. Various studies prove that public speaking and presentation skills are acquired and require constant practice and refinement.

The first few minutes are the most important in a presentation. People generally remember information best at this time, so valuable information should be provided in the initial moments.

People are also good at picking up on a speaker's emotions and impressions. Listeners tend to react similarly -- if the speaker smiles, the listeners will smile too.

In general, visuals are very important. Studies show that people remember material presented in such a way better, so more visuals are needed.

It is essential that the speaker speaks in simple sentences, often addressing the audience with

"you," "we," and similar addresses.

Finally, the presenter should definitely thank the audience and tell them that it was a pleasure to interact with them in this way.

**To deliver an effective presentation, consider the following:**

- We should thoroughly research the issue in advance and be prepared to answer additional questions about it.
- Rehearse before the presentation.
- Be demanding and more critical of yourself.
- It would be good if we made the presentation interactive.
- Be in a good mood during the presentation, it is contagious.
- During a presentation, it is important to make eye contact with the audience, control your voice, and tone.
- It is important to draw a conclusion that will leave a final impression on the audience.
- In any case, let's think about the next successful presentation and do the best we can.

If presentations in various subjects become an integral part of the learning process, adolescents will be much better prepared to face new challenges in life. At the same time, the learning process will be much more interesting and diverse.

*A teacher must not only be a good presenter themselves, but also develop this skill in their students. It is not necessary to be a "great artist" to give a good presentation; it is easy to become a good orator after some practice.*

## Vietnamese Education Strategy Eyes rise in international students

According to a recent report by the British Council, these decisions include some significant highlights concerning international students and Vietnamese higher education institutions.

Vietnam aims to increase the proportion of international students in the country to 1.5% (currently 0.5%) and raise the number of Vietnamese universities in the global top 500 rankings (currently none) and the top 200 of Asian ranking systems (currently four).

It also seeks to ensure that over 20% of joint training programs in Vietnam are offered by overseas partners ranked among the top 500 universities.

The Vietnamese government wants to establish several strategies to develop education, science, research, and innovation

in the country by 2030 with a vision to 2045.

Titled 'Resolution 57-NQ/TW,' this strategy outlines several key goals, including raising investment in research and development to 2% of GDP, enhancing the integration between research and training, achieving a 10% annual increase in international publications, and boosting translation output by 8-10% annually.

The priority research areas include artificial intelligence, the Internet of Things, big data, cloud computing, blockchain, semiconductors, quantum technology, nanotechnology, 5G and 6G mobile communications, satellite technology, and other emerging technologies.

Another initiative titled 'Decision 1705/QĐ-Ttg' focuses on building education development strategies by 2030, while 'Decision 1600/QĐ-Ttg' looks at international integration in education

and training.

Additional goals include having over 80% of higher education institutions engage in joint research or collaboration projects with international partners, accrediting more than 20% of Vietnamese training programs through prestigious overseas bodies, and attracting two new branch campuses of the top 500 global universities to Vietnam.

A long-term goal is establishing English as the second language within the education system.

Moreover, a recent report commissioned by the British Council found that Vietnam may emerge as a central education hub in Southeast Asia, similar to Singapore and Malaysia.

With Vietnam already being a key study destination for students from Laos, Cambodia, and China, the report conduct-

ed a comprehensive review of international engagement in the country.

Vietnam's aim to facilitate international student recruitment and transnational education opportunities comes at a time when the country has earned itself a reputation as a major source market in

the region.

According to Acumen, Vietnam represents 37% of the Southeast Asian market, ahead of Malaysia (16%), Indonesia (16%), and Thailand (9%).

Approximately 140,000 Vietnamese students are pursuing higher education abroad, with

many others enrolled in sub-degree programs and language studies.
